

Protect Disabled Parents' Rights

HD.2670/S.1037:

An Act prohibiting discrimination against adults with disabilities in Family and Juvenile Court proceedings

PARENTS WITH DISABILITIES SHOULD NOT BE DENIED THE RIGHT TO PARENT THEIR CHILDREN.

Parents with disabilities, especially psychiatric or intellectual disabilities, inappropriately lose custody or parenting time at alarming rates due to disability discrimination.

HD.2670/SD.679 will require courts to...

- Determine if a parent's disability causes actual harm to a child based on evidence, not assumptions.
- Explain in writing if a parent's disability is a negative factor in custody and parenting time decisions.
- Assess if the harm can be avoided with adaptive equipment or supportive services for the parent

HD.2670/SD.679 will not cost the state money and may even save taxpayer dollars by preventing unnecessary foster care placements.

FEDERAL LAW IS NOT ENOUGH.

The US Departments of Justice and Health and Human Services entered into a settlement agreement with Massachusetts Department of Children and Families (DCF) to address disability discrimination.

➤ Moms with disabilities are **significantly more likely to stay in abusive relationships** out of fear of losing their children.

➤ **Nearly one in 10 children** in the U.S. are at risk of being removed from their home by a child welfare agency simply because their parent has a disability.

➤ While 6.2% of parents in the U.S. have a disability, **19% of children** in foster care have a parent with a disability.

➤ Stereotypes and biases about military service and mental health disabilities can **deter veterans** from seeking treatment and lead to errors in custody cases.

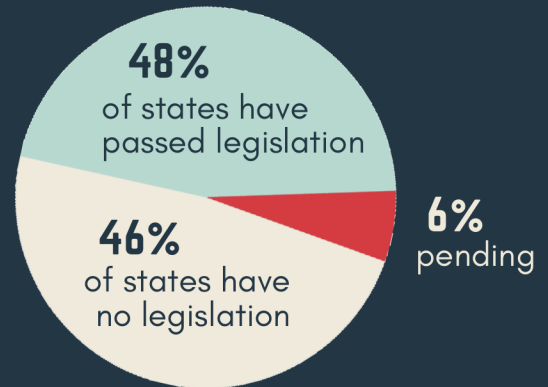
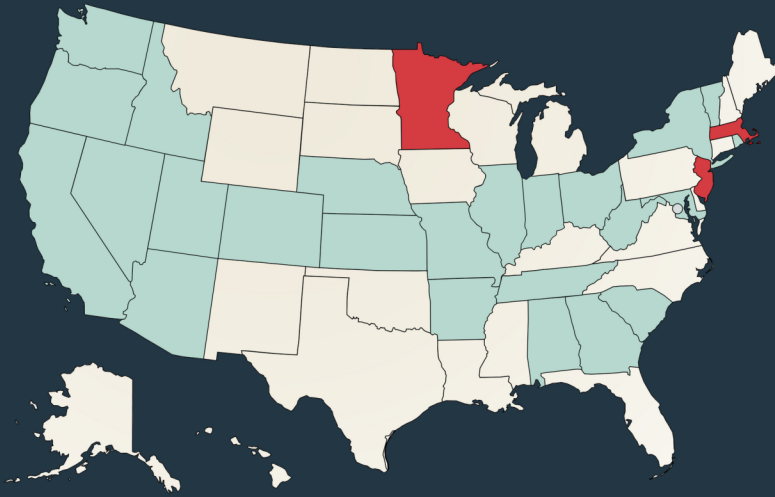
